Don Laughlin and the Riverside Resort Hotel

Don Laughlin (1931-2023), Nevada resort town namesake



Don Laughlin, a developer, casino operator, and hotelier who built the Nevada resort town of Laughlin, which was named after himself and is now the third largest casino destination in the state, died October 22, 2023, at the age of 92.

Growing up in Owatonna, Minnesota, Laughlin worked as a fur trapper while in high school. He used the proceeds to buy slot machines which he installed in hunting lodges. The venture proved successful enough for him to drop out of school.

Laughlin soon moved to Las Vegas and purchased the

101 Club Casino. After selling the casino, he spotted a stretch of land while flying over the Nevada desert in which he envisioned building a resort in 1964. He purchased a ramshackle motel on the otherwise desolate property; and Laughlin, Nevada was born.

Laughlin's casino began small, offering a few games and four guest rooms, but he expanded throughout the 1970's, '80's, and '90's. The casino was also fortuitously located by a major stop along Route 66. Two new 14 story hotels added hundreds of rooms and more hotel expansions followed. He butted heads with state officials in order to construct a bridge over the Colorado River to give people easier access to the growing town. He also financed the construction of the nearby Laughlin-Bullhead International Airport.

Today the town's population is less than 9,000 but as of 2019, it draws close to 2 million visitors a year. It is the third most visited casino destination in the state and one of the nation's major RV destinations.

In his later years, Laughlin spent time on his ranch, flew his personal helicopter and walked the casino floor. He also visited his hometown in Minnesota often for the Steele County Free Fair.

As a car enthusiast, Don enjoyed driving through and looking at all the Corvettes parked in his parking lot during past Gambler's Classic events. He will be missed. By Virgil Miller

Caravan Rules



un runs are a great way to get to know other COB members and to enjoy your Corvette. These events don't just happen, they require a lot of planning. Here are a few things to help you get the most out of an outing.

Start of the Run.

We usually have a meeting place and a time to show up. We use this time to socialize and have a driver's meeting. Club shirts and name tags make us look like a cohesive club. Your vehicle should be full of gas and road worthy. Have your radios charged or fresh batteries and set to the proper channel. Have some snacks and water for longer runs. Bring some cash for the raffles.

Caravan Tips.

Following the Corvette in front of you sounds easy, but there are times when you get caught by a signal light or other traffic. Don't panic and remember safety first. You should know your route that was given at the driver's meeting. Also, the leader will slow down to let others catch up. You can always use your radio and let the leader know you are caught in traffic so the leader can slow down to let others catch up.

The most important thing you can do in congested areas that have multiple lanes... is use all lanes. Unless there is a turn coming up, use all the lanes. Once you are out of the congested area you can safely merge back into the single file caravan. After a stop and you start to merge back on the road be careful not to accelerate too quickly causing rocks to be thrown on the car behind you. If safe, the last vehicle should pull out with flasher on to block traffic allowing a buffer for the other cars to pull out.

Start of Tour: Please be on time and make sure your Corvette is prepared and ready for the trip. Start with a FULL tank of fuel and make sure you check your oil level and radiator coolant level. Tires need to be checked and inflated to the manufacturer's recommended tire pressure. Tires cannot be past the manufactures' recommended serviceability period (depending on manufacturer between 6 and 10 years). It is a good idea to have basic tools and spare parts. It is also recommended to have a two-way FRS radio set to channel 5 for communication.

Obey Traffic Laws: You must obey the Basic Speed Law. You may never drive faster than is safe for current conditions and never more than the posted speed limit. Remember, fun and safety are paramount, a ticket or accident would spoil everyone's day.

Togetherness: Keeping the tour together is done by the tour leader with your help. The tour leader slows after going through congested areas or making major course changes. The tour leader knows how many cars are in the tour and is always looking to the end Corvette. You can help by safely keeping up with the Corvette ahead of you. The lead Corvette and the end Corvette should always have a two-way radio and a list of Club cell phone numbers.

Congested Areas: When going through a toll gate or small town where there may be multiple traffic signals, and if no turns are coming up, it is helpful to occupy 2 or 3 lanes to shorten the length of the group. Get back into position after the congested area (single column). The tour leader will slow the column to allow time to regroup.

Trouble Signals: To be used only when you must stop. In the daytime, turn on headlights (not parking lights). At night, flash your headlights on and off. On this signal, only the car immediately behind the troubled car and/ or the assigned troubleshooter car stops. All others continue with the tour leader who will pull off and stop at the next appropriate and safe turnout spot. Two-way radios tuned to channel 5 are used if possible, at the front, middle and rear. For road hazards where there is not time to announce on the two-way radio, safely swerve well around the hazard to signal the cars behind you of the hazard. The last Corvette should be assigned by the tour leader as his spotter or trouble car. Depending on the length of the run, one of the two COB emergency kits must be carried by a caravan participant in case of an emergency.

To resume the tour after a stop: Merge back onto the roadway following the car in front of you and only when safe to do so. If safe, the last vehicle should pull out to block traffic allowing a buffer for the other cars to pull out.

Guests are always welcome: If your guest is in a Corvette, have him or her stay behind you, and then they only have to keep track of you. Anyone driving a "Tin" car (cars other than a Corvette) must stay at the rear and behind the last Corvette. Waivers for guest driver and passenger will have to be signed. By Virgil Miller



C8 Corvette Corner



HEATPROOFING THE C8 CORVETTE TRUNK

t will be almost 3 years since I bought the C8 Corvette and I have never regretted it. It is a wonderful car in many ways but it does have its faults. One of them is the overheating of the trunk area at temperatures in excess of 130° as a result of the exhaust running underneath it; not to mention the engine residing right in front of it. Summer temperatures in Bakersfield will raise it much higher. Groceries in the back would be a no-no on anything except a super short trip and luggage would get very hot on long trips. You may find kits for sale for about \$150.00, but you can do it for much less with materials from Amazon and it is well worth the time and effort in installing it. I wish I had done it much sooner.



It took me less than two hours with a help of my wonderful assistant, Christine. The reason for the different color materials was that I bought them on separate occasions when I decided to go two layers and, also, I found the gold material to be much cheaper. I also had two squares of aluminized dynamat which were given to me that I installed on the floor of the trunk right above the exhaust. It is thicker material and I thought it would serve it's purpose a lot better in that location. The gold and silver sheeting that I used is essentially the same material; only different colors and dimensions. The

difference in temperature is phenomenal. On my recent trip to Laughlin, pulling out the luggage, the temperature was no different than having it in the trunk of an ordinary vehicle. Temperatures were reduced in excess of 30 to 40° YouTube videos are available to help you in your task. Just search "C8 Corvette trunk insulation".




Automotive Technology Scholarship
