in Glenwood Springs, Colorado. Lots of photo opportunities.




wooded settlement a dirt road near the small town of Elizabeth, Colorado,

The ranch has over 350 restored examples of the marque. They are all pristine and operational. All are stored in large warehouses with no signs of dust or oil drippings. They are arranged by years and models and include period-correct memorabilia and other related items such as apparel.

Besides the great exhibits at the Museum, attendees were treated to an extensive exhibit of current and future Corvette models. The center of attraction was of course the new ZR1 of which GM had several examples, one of which was a cut-away showing the internals of the car. Several engineers were on hand to answer questions and provide visitors a walk-around tour of the cars.



I was able to attend several seminars during the event and talk with engineers from companies associated with the Corvette, most notably Michelin and Mobil 1.

I attended two book signings where I was able to get my copies of two writers' books signed. Richard Prince wrote *Corvette 70 Years, The One and Only* and he writes a monthly tech column in Corvette Magazine in which he answers readers' questions about their Corvettes that no one else has been able to answer. I read his column first before anything else when I get my monthly copy.

Scott Kolecki wrote *Corvette Concept Cars: Developing America's Favorite Sports Car*. Scott did extensive research at the NCM's Archive Library as well as GM's archives in Detroit to ensure complete accuracy and to amass photos rarely seen before.


I was fortunate enough to chat with each at length and walked away with signed books and contact information so I may contact them in the future if I think they can be of assistance.

We visited local establishments and ventured out to local distilleries, dairy barns with fresh ice cream, and assorted local attractions like the Railroad Museum and the Lost River Caves. We traveled to Nashville for the Music Row experience (very crowded!), a tour of the Hermitage (Andrew Jackson's home), and the General Jackson Showboat cruise. The ice creme cone came from Chaney's Dairy Barn, one of Guy Fieri's stops for Diners, Drive-ins, and Dives.

On the last night, we got together and played games in the hotel lobby. What a way to cap off this adventure. The next day most left straight for home, others set out to visit family and friends along the way.

What do you get when you send four COB members to college? You get four IDA (Independent Detailers Association) Certified Auto Detailers ready to take on the world of detailing beautiful cars. The IDA is a worldwide organization with its members committed to the excellence in the profession of auto detailing. It is an ongoing learning experience and members learn from each other through webinars, educational articles and through other people's educational experiences as well. COB members Terri Romanoff, Virgil Miller, Mark Pucilowski and Adrian Medina took advantage of this great opportunity to learn about auto detailing and earn our IDA certificates.

To be certified through Bakersfield College, we went through a 2 1/2 month online course to learn the essentials of auto detailing and through on-hand use of equipment, chemicals and materials on our personal vehicles as well as helping others. There is so much to learn and a lot of it will depend on personal experience.

BC instructor, Andrew Haney, was so instrumental in showing us the right and wrong way of doing things. He has a wealth of knowledge and experience and has so much to offer us. We also had the pleasure of working with younger students who are eager to help us old codgers.

One of the things we learned was as simple as the procedure of washing your vehicle (see next article). Other things we learned are how to polish and preserve the paint with waxes and the ultimate...ceramic coating. We also learned interior cleaning and preservation and we were taught the procedure for clarifying headlight lenses.

The BC Automotive Technology Department is offering the community no credit detailing class free of charge and COB had first dibs in placement thanks to our commitment to the Renegade Automotive Technology Scholarship. ## **How To Wash Your Corvette**

#### A Guide to Properly Washing Your Vehicle:

By Virgil Miller, Certified Detailer with Insights from Andrew Haney's Automotive Detailing Course

This article is a culmination of the valuable knowledge I gained while taking an automotive detailing course under the expert guidance of instructor Andrew Haney at Bakersfield College. Some of the content here is drawn directly from the course material, providing foundational insights into how to effectively clean the exterior of your vehicle and maintain its appearance. If you're looking to learn the best methods for preserving your car's paintwork while



giving it a professional shine, this guide is for you.

#### Do You Know? The Hidden Dangers of Improper Washing

One of the most common ways vehicles acquire unsightly swirls and scratches is during the washing process itself. Products that aren't designed for automotive paint, combined with improper techniques, can cause significant damage—sometimes in just one wash. Consider the example of a conveyor-driven car wash: while convenient, these washes often drag dirt and grime from the vehicles ahead of you across your car's delicate paint surface. Add to that the fact that these car washes recycle water, which may be filtered but often isn't replaced frequently enough, and it's easy to see why a quick wash could end up harming your vehicle.

#### The Wrong Way to Wash Your Car

There are several common practices that can damage your vehicle's exterior, often unknowingly. Here's a breakdown of what not to do:

1. *The Family Affair:* While it's fun to get the family involved in washing the car, children might not realize that they've dropped the sponge on the ground, picking up sand and dirt that will scratch the paint. If you involve kids, make sure they're educated on proper techniques and always have extra sponges and towels on hand.

2. *Fundraiser Washes:* Car washes organized as fundraisers often feature volunteers who are untrained in proper detailing techniques. If you're passionate about the cause, it's better to simply donate money rather than risk letting them wash your car.

3. *Automatic Car Washes:* While automated washes are quick and easy, the highspeed brushes and recycled water grind dirt into your paintwork, often leaving scratches and swirl marks. The risks of damage far outweigh the convenience.

#### The Correct Methods for a Flawless Finish

When it comes to washing your vehicle, you have several options, each designed to minimize damage while delivering a superior clean. While some methods may be more costly than others, you don't have to break the bank to achieve professional results. Based on the level of dirt and grime on your vehicle, you can choose between the following techniques:

- 1. Two-Bucket Wash
- 2. Foam Cannon (Garden Hose or Pressure Washer)
- 3. Pressure Washer Foam Cannon

#### Two-Bucket Wash: The Gold Standard

The two-bucket method is a tried-and-true technique that, when done properly, can significantly reduce the risk of adding scratches or swirl marks to your paint. Here's how to do it:

#### What You'll Need:

- Two buckets
- Two grit guards
- · Microfiber wash mitt or sponge
- Neutral pH car wash soap
- Optional foam cannon
- · High-quality microfiber drying towels

#### Step-by-Step Process:

1. **Rinse the Vehicle:** Begin by rinsing your vehicle with water to remove loose dirt and debris. A garden hose works fine, but if you're using a pressure washer, keep the pressure low to avoid damaging the paint.



2. **Pre-Treatment (Bug and Tar Remover):** For stubborn contaminants like bugs or road tar, use a bug and tar remover while the vehicle is still wet (don't let it dry). Bug and tar removers contain solvents and cleaning agents designed to soften and loosen road tar and solidified bug carcasses. They can also be enzyme-based. You can use these products as a pre-treatment for washing or as a spot treatment. A few specialized sponges that assist with bug and tar removal are available if desired. Most bug and tar removers are also effective at removing bird droppings and road grime. To remove excessive road grime, using a degreaser may be needed.





3. **Two-Bucket Washing:** The key to this method is using two separate buckets —one filled with soapy water and the other with clean rinse water. Place a grit guard at the bottom of each bucket to catch dirt and

debris. Grit guards are plastic devices about 2 1/2" tall and full of holes, which go into the bottom of your buckets. After washing a section of the car, rinse your mitt in the rinse bucket to remove the dirt before dipping it back into the soapy water. This prevents transferring contaminants back onto the vehicle's surface.





4. **Foam Cannons:** For an added layer of protection, consider using a foam cannon. Foam cannons coat the vehicle with a thick, lubricating layer of foam, which minimizes direct contact with the paint. The foam provides additional lubrication, reducing the chances of scratching. For heavier dirt, you can take that sponge or wash mitt and lightly go over each panel to loosen any tougher debris before rinsing. There are two main types: one for use with a garden hose and another for a pressure washer.

#### 5. Wheels and Tires:

Always use a separate bucket and wash mitt for the wheels and tires. These areas are prone to brake dust and road grime, and using the same mitt on both the tires and the body can cause contamination and scratches.



6. **Rinse the Vehicle:** Thoroughly rinse the car with clean water, ensuring all soap and debris are removed. Using deionized water insures that your car will dry spot free.

#### 7. Drying the Vehicle: The Key to a Spotless Finish

After washing, it's crucial to dry your car properly to avoid water spots, which are caused by mineral deposits. Unless you are using deionized water, you must dry your vehicle as soon as possible. Deionized water is water that is filtered to remove the minerals, which cause water spots. Since most of us don't have deionized water, we need to use a special microfiber drying towel. These are very thick, soft, and absorbent towels.



The method you choose depends on your preference, but here are the most common techniques:

#### Towel Drying:

Towel drying is by far the most common method. It is also the most damaging method depending on how and what you use. When drying with a towel, always wipe in one direction and flip or turn regularly. Avoid drying in circular motions;

remember, we don't want to add swirl marks. Avoid terrycloth towels, paper towels, and chamois. Use a high-quality microfiber towel to gently dry your vehicle. The microfiber drying towels I use for cars are specifically made for dry and cost \$30+ each. Always make sure you use a microfiber towel that is large enough to dry the surface. These towels should be plush and soft and designed to dry. They shouldn't have any edging, which can cause scratching. I recommend having two or three towels on hand should you need to replace one during the drying. To prevent scratches, DO NOT continue using a towel that has been dropped on the floor. Also. do not apply force as you dry. We are simply drying water from the car, not trying to remove surface contamination. • **Air Drying with a Blower**: A specialized car air blower is a great tool for drying, as it uses pressurized air to blow water out of nooks and crannies without touching the surface. Avoid using leaf blowers or other non-automotive blowers, as they aren't as effective and could introduce dirt.

• Water Blade or Squeegee: While a silicone water blade or squeegee can quickly remove excess water, this method is best avoided for regular use on the paint, as it can lead to scratches over time. However, it's suitable for glass surfaces or quick drying jobs.

• Air Drying (Deionized Water): If you have access to deionized water, you can let your vehicle air dry. Deionized water lacks the minerals that cause water spots, leaving you with a spotless finish. Deionized water filters are available, but they can be expensive.

#### **Finishing Touches**

Once your vehicle is clean and dry, apply a few finishing touches to really make it shine:

• **Clean the Glass and Chrome:** Use a dedicated microfiber towel and glass cleaner to clean the windows and chrome trim. Glass cleaner is also safe to use on chrome.

• **Tire Shine:** Apply a tire dressing to restore the deep black look of your tires. Be sure to use a tire sponge to evenly distribute the product and wipe off any excess. Tire dressing comes in different sheens.

• **Detail Spray:** A quick detail spray can add an extra layer of protection and shine to your vehicle's paint. You just spray it on in small sections and wipe it down with a microfiber cloth. This product protects your finish an also helps reduce the amount of time required for your next wash.

#### **Maintaining Your Equipment**

To keep your washing gear in top condition, make sure to clean your microfiber towels after each use. Wash them in cold water with a clear laundry detergent and avoid using fabric softeners, which can damage the fibers. Air drying or machine dry on low heat is best to preserve their softness. High heat will damage microfiber towels.

#### **Car Show Ready**

For those looking to touch up their vehicle before a car show, a rinseless car wash spray is a quick and effective solution. Simply spray it on, wipe it off with a microfiber towel, and follow up with a detailing spray for a flawless, shiny finish.



























#### **Automotive Technology Scholarship**
